



### Drive up in style.

Whether your dream car is a spruced up '57 Chevy convertible, a classic Cadillac, Rolls Royce, Bentley, or a stretch limousine, there are car rental companies to suit every taste for a fantasy ride to your wedding ceremony.

### Music is essential.

Since elopements tend to be in less conventional locations from natural settings to smaller spaces, a harp may not be practical, so go for an acoustic guitar or violin for musical accompaniment.

Picture it: you are gazing into each other's eyes beneath a gorgeous sunset as a violinist and vocalist provide musical accompaniment just for the two of you. It will always be your song.

Pictures to last a lifetime.

To make things interesting, you can also hire two photographers, one to shoot digital pictures and one to shoot on film. Digital photography allows for unlimited and candid shots. Film is more limited and needs to be planned out and posed, but shooting a handful of posed photos on film will give some of your pictures a softer quality that only film can capture.

Keep the day or evening going with a post-wedding sunset drive, a three-course meal, or perhaps a small group dinner and round of toasts if you choose to invite a handful of guests to your wedding.

### Take a mini-moon.
