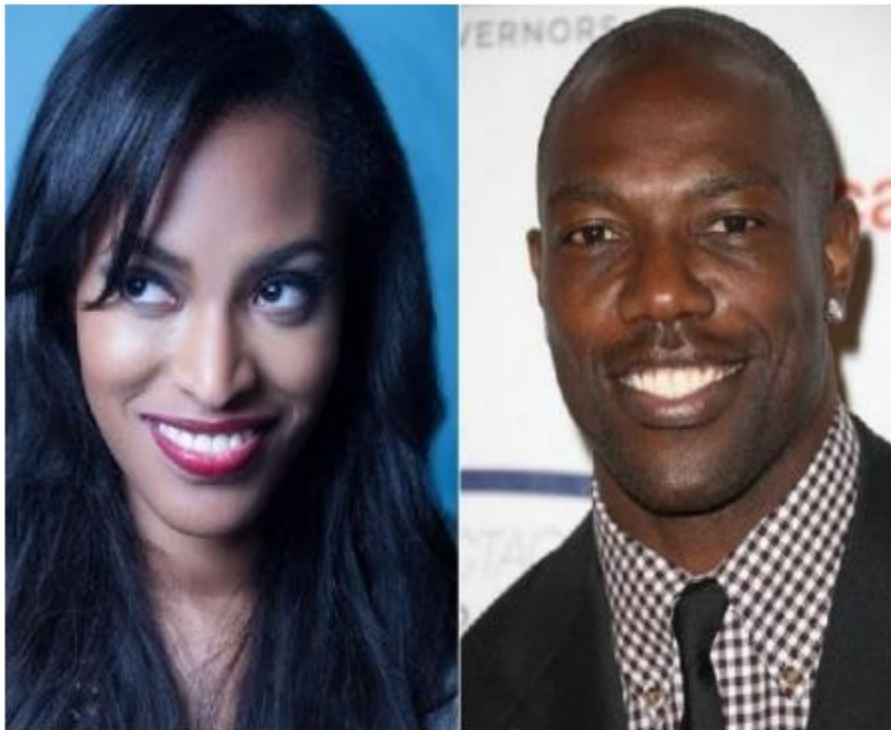

Now, Terrell has tried to steal his friend's thunder and her spotlight, launching his own campaign to be the first black *Bachelor*. Misse's response to her friend's ploy, "Copycat!" And Terrell Owens knows he stole this idea from his friend. "Terrell is hiding from me because he knows he is in trouble!" slams Misse.

Terrell made his announcement declaring that he wants to be TV's first black *Bachelor* on April 7th via a viral video clip announcing he is ready to do "bigger and better things with his life."

Former first black "Bachelorette" hopeful, Misse Harris, calls encroachment on former NFL wide receiver, Terrell Owens, for stealing black "Bachelor" idea.

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, Misse Harris should consider herself complimented. Using her platform created by her public 2013 campaign to be ABC's first black *Bachelorette*, Misse Harris has become an influential voice for the positive depiction of African-American women in all forms of media. Misse continues to fight for equal rights in how African American women are portrayed on television. "Equality has come a long way, but stereotypes, especially of black women, are still rampant in the media and in popular culture," states Misse.



ABC's *The Bachelor/The Bachelorette* franchise remains television's dating reality show mainstay for contestants looking for their one true love, and some television exposure. After 12 years on the air - 18 seasons of *The Bachelor* and 9 seasons of *The Bachelorette* - the only role African-American singles have portrayed on the show remains the "token black person" who is there to fill a quota and be voted off within the first or second round.

Misse Harris, after being picked last year to appear on the show as one of the contestants, decided to break the mold of the stereotypical role of black women on reality television, and she petitioned to be ABC's first black *Bachelorette*. As her message grew legs, Misse began to appear in and on plenty of A-List media outlets. E!N's *Showbiz Tonight* featured Misse as a guest and Misse, herself, blogged for CNN, while *Time Magazine* agreed with Misse's stance on the calling out of *The Bachelor/Bachelorette* franchise, and *HuffPost Live* championed her cause, declaring, "I hope she succeeds."

During her popular media campaign to be the first black *Bachelorette*, who was Misse's biggest supporter? Her friend, former NFL wide receiver Terrell Owens. Taking to Twitter, Terrell tweeted his followers to share his support for Misse Harris's campaign.
